

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MINUTES OF THE BOARD OF DIRECTORS CHEROKEE WATER COMPANY Executive Session October 16, 2023

An executive session meeting of the Board of Directors for Cherokee Water Company was held at 6:25 pm on Monday, October 16, 2023, at NK 20 Lake Cherokee, Longview Texas 75603 with the following Directors present:

Christy Bussey, President Logan Lobue, Vice President Gary Mapes, Secretary Randy Graves, Treasurer Rhonda Bullard Kristina Coolidge Seleta Davis Cory Eason Doug Finn Paul Oberthier

President Christy Bussey called the meeting to order at 6:20 pm.

Vote on Directors' Absences

President Bussey provided a copy of and read the bylaws regarding attendance requirements for directors. Board members present who had 4 or more absences were given the opportunity to address the group regarding their absences.

A vote was taken by closed ballot regarding removal of any director who had been absent 4 times or more during the attendance year. The written votes were collected and counted independently by the General Manager and Office Manager who reported the outcome to the entire board. A 2/3 majority voted to remove Director Doug Finn.

With no other business, President Christy Bussey adjourned the meeting at 6:35 pm.

MINUTES OF THE BOARD OF DIRECTORS CHEROKEE WATER COMPANY October 19,2023

A meeting of the Board of Directors of Cherokee Water Company was held at 6:00 pm on Thursday, October 19, 2023, at NK 20 Lake Cherokee, Longview Texas 75603 with the following Directors present:

Christy Bussey, President Logan Lobue, Vice President Randy Graves, Treasurer Gary Mapes, Secretary Kristina Coolidge Rhonda Bullard Seleta Davis Cory Eason Paul Oberthier Thomas Merritt – absent

President Christy Bussey called the meeting to order at 6:00 pm Gary Mapes, Secretary, pronounced a quorum.

Minutes of the September 21st board meeting were discussed. Rhonda Bullard requested a change be made to indicate that the motion she made last month to approve variance for NR18 was actually made by Rules Committee vs herself as she opposed the motion. A motion was made by Seleta Davis and seconded by Logan Lobue to approve the revised minutes. The motion was approved unanimously. In the future, another committee member should make the motion when Chairman of the committee is in the minority of the overall committee recommendation.

A motion was made by Paul Oberthier and seconded by Randy Graves to approve the minutes of the Executive Session on Monday, October 16th. The motion was approved unanimously.

President's Report:

Christy Bussey's message to the board of directors:

Fellow Directors,

As most of you know I chose not to run for re-election for the board of directors at CWC because I am embarking on a new professional journey that will demand 100% of my time and focus. This is my last monthly board meeting with only the annual shareholder meeting remaining. I wanted to take a few minutes to address all of you as a group. For the next month I am still a director, but I hope to always be a resident of this wonderful community and in that capacity, I want you to know how much I appreciate just a few of the things that you've accomplished over the last few years.

l appreciate you:

- 1. Voting to bring back the 2-rule reading.
- 2. Implementing shareholders surveys for feedback and your continued commitment to enhance and add technology that makes communication as effective and efficient as it can be.
- 3. Voting to add shareholders and staff members to board committees.
- 4. Adding an operational report presentation to board meetings where shareholders are present as guests of the board.
- Creating and continuing to enhance a strategy for CWC.
- Engaging experts and obtaining reports and studies for critical assets owned by CWC such as natural resources, the road system and the siltation and sedimentation situation so that fully informed decisions can be made for the future of CWC.
- Engaging an independent 3rd party for the recruitment and hiring of a highly qualified and competent General Manager for Cherokee Water Company.
- Making difficult decisions and upholding your fiduciary duties to CWC despite misinformation, hearsay and sometimes even personal attacks.

Next, I want to thank you for doing a volunteer position that has zero benefits except for the personal satisfaction of knowing that you are serving in a role which allows you to do what's best for CWC and as a result of that what's best for the community and ultimately the shareholders. Finally, to those existing board members who are running for the board again, I applaud you. The fact you are running again speaks directly to your commitment to give the time that is required to serve on this corporate board and to your love for the community you live in.

It has been a privilege and an honor to serve all of you even through the most difficult and controversial situations. Good luck as you move forward, and you and all future board members have my commitment to always remember the tough job you have.

General Manager's Report

Kevin provided an operation report including stats on administrative, patrol and maintenance departments. Kevin stated that the roadway project is completed. The crew did a great job with the repairs. Kevin shared that several approved capital projects will begin. The repairs on the CWC office and Library roofs will begin In November and take about 5-6 weeks to complete. This includes an expansion to the outdoor patio to address the drainage issue. Also, repairs to the boat roads will begin once additional product is received that is needed to repair the pile driver. The marking of Silvey Bridge Lake Road will begin in the next 2-3 weeks depending on the contractor's schedule. Kevin reminded everyone that the Election Ballots will be dropped in the mail on Monday, October 23rd. The deadline for returning the ballots is November7th. Any ballots not post-marked by November 7th will be turned over to the election committee for review. An email was sent out with additional information regarding usage of proxies. If you didn't receive email, check your spam or junk mail.

Treasurers Report:

Randy Graves shared that the September financials will be reviewed at the completion of the audit.

- Randy Graves, Treasurer made a motion to certify the bills paid for the month ending September 2023. The second was made by Rhonda Bullard. The motion passed unanimously.
- Randy Graves made a motion to increase the 2023-2024 budget by \$105k due to an increase in insurance premiums. The second was made by Logan Lobue. The motion passed unanimously.

Committee Reports:

Community Relations Committee Report

Kristina Coolidge, Committee Chairman shared The Community Relations Committee did not meet this month due to the Q&A session by the Board Candidates. She shared that the committee recognizes the increase in communications that are being sent to shareholders to keep them informed.

The Community Relations Committee is working with the office to expand communications with shareholders.

Rhonda Bullard shared an update regarding the 75th anniversary that will be celebrated at the Annual Shareholders meeting. The committee has no specific action items to vote on at this time.

Rules and Policies Committee:

Rhonda Bullard, Committee Chair reported.

2nd reading:

Current Rule:

Construction Rules & Regs, IV. Houses, Mobile Homes, and other Buildings, C.

Work must commence within ninety (90) days from the date on which the permit is issued. For a residential structure, all exterior construction must be completed within twelve (12) months. For all other non-residential structures, all work must be complete within six (6) months from issuance of the permit. Permit extensions may be issued at the discretion of the Lake Manager or his/her designee for verifiable delays. Failure to comply with the above timeline requirements will result in fines of one thousand dollars (\$1,000.00) per month. Any work which commences without the issuance of an appropriate permit may be immediately stopped by the Lake Manager or his/her designated representatives.

2nd Reading:

Construction Rules & Regs, IV. Houses, Mobile Homes, and other Buildings, C.

Work must commence within ninety (90) days from the date on which the permit is issued. For a residential structure, all exterior construction must be completed within twelve (12) months. For all other non-residential structures, all work must be complete within six (6) months from issuance of the permit. Permit extensions may be issued at the discretion of the General Manager or his/her designee for verifiable delays. If a permit extension is granted, the work must be completed within 12 months of the extension date. Any future extensions that are granted will be for 6 months at a time. Failure to comply with the above timeline requirements will result in fines of one thousand dollars (\$1,000.00) per month. Any work which commences without the issuance of an appropriate permit may be immediately stopped by the Lake Manager or his/her designated representatives.

A motion was made by Rhonda Bullard and seconded by Seleta Davis. The motion passed unanimously.

1st Reading

Addition to current rule:

New Rule Addition, Proposed by Cherokee Fishing Club to Rules & Policies Committee: VII. Fishing A. 2. The General Manager will determine what fish species should be raised in the brood ponds, based on recommendations from the Biologist Consultant and recommendations from a specified member of the Cherokee Fishing Club. Any activity related to fish in brood ponds will be overseen and approved by the General Manager.

Current #2 and #3 will be renumbered #3 and #4.

Variance Requests

Five variance requests submitted, four being proposed:

- NJ 08 & 09-Shareholder leases both lots. Request is to cross property line to connect the existing home to a new addition, to be closer than 75' to the water and 50' to the lake road. Second submission; new request includes septic plan and survey of NJ 09 w/improvements as requested by Committee. Motion to approve was made by Rhonda Bullard and Seconded by Randy Graves. The motion passed unanimously.
- 2. NE 26: Request to build a deck behind the house. The deck will be 45 ft from the lake. Motion to approve was made by Rhonda Bullard and seconded by Logan Lobue. The motion passed unanimously.
- 3. ST 04: New carport to be located 2.6 feet off adjacent property line of ST 03. Motion to approve was made by Rhonda Bullard and seconded by Paul Oberthier. The motion passed unanimously.
- 4. ST 83: Reconstruction of back porch. One corner will be 73 feet from the lake. Motion to approve was made by Rhonda Bullard and seconded by Kristina Coolidge. The motion passed unanimously.

Bylaw Revisions Proposed by RMWBH Law Firm and CWC Rules & Policies Committee

General Changes:

- 1. Lake Manager changed to General Manager throughout document.
- 2. Numerous capitalization, spelling and grammar corrections through document.

Article III, Meetings of Shareholders, Sec 6:

A quorum for the transaction of business at any meeting of shareholders shall be a number of shareholders representing not less than one-third of the shares entitled to vote that are represented at the meeting in person or by proxy. A quorum is required to transact CWC business. Shareholders present at any meeting in person or by proxy, though less than a quorum, may adjourn the meeting to a future time.

Article V, Directors, Sec 2:

The number of directors shall be twelve (12). Each director shall be a shareholder or spouse of a shareholder. Each director shall be chosen in a manner specified in Article IV or Article V, Section 9 of these bylaws. The term of each director shall be three (3) years. A director's term shall begin when election results are presented at the Annual Shareholder Meeting and expire at the conclusion of the Annual Shareholder Meeting three years later. The terms shall be staggered so that four terms expire each year, and four directors are elected each year. A greater number may be elected in the event of a vacancy.

Article V. Directors, Sec 16:

The board of directors may from time to time adopt or amend such rules and regulations and internal operating policies and procedures as it deems reasonable and necessary for the orderly operation, improvement, enhancement of value, maintenance and safety of the Cherokee Water Company, Lake Cherokee and its shareholders, waters, surrounding acreage and residential lots. Further, the board of directors, upon an affirmative vote of at least 2/3 of the board of directors, shall be responsible for any action taken on the employment of the General Manager position.

Article VI., Officers, Sec 1: The officers of this Corporation shall be a president, a vicepresident, secretary, and treasurer who_shall be elected for the term of one (1) year and shall hold office until their successors are duly elected and qualified. No one shall be eligible to the office of the president, vicepresident, secretary or treasurer who is not a director of the Corporation and any such officer who ceases to be a director shall cease to be an officer. _The president, vice-president, secretary, and treasurer shall, collectively, form the Executive Committee.

Article VII, Committees of the Board, Sections 1, 2, 3

Sec 1: The president may designate nonstanding and ad hoc committees.

Sec. 2. The board of directors shall have the following standing committees: (i) the Executive Committee; (ii) the Ethics Committees; (iii) the Finance Committee; (iv) the Strategic Planning Committee; and (v) the Rules & Policies **Committees.** Standing committees shall include directors and may also include other ex officio non-voting members as elected by a majority of the committee. Each committee shall consist of at least one or more directors appointed by the President. The number of committee members may be increased or decreased from time to time at the discretion of the **Executive Committee.**

The directors serving on committees shall serve one (1) year or until new members are appointed. Each committee member shall serve as such until the earliest of (i) the expiration of the one (1) year appointment; (ii) resignation as a director; or (iii) removal as a committee member or as a director.

Sec 3. The president shall have the power at any time to fill vacancies in, to change the membership of, to remove members and to discharge any **non-standing_**committee.

A motion to approve the bylaw changes was made by Rhonda Bullard and seconded by Logan Lobue. The motion passed unanimously.

Corrected capitalization, punctuation and grammar throughout document.

and Regulations, the following words mean and are defined as indicated: **Board of Directors** - Persons duly elected to serve as directors of Cherokee Water Company Corporation. **CWC** - Cherokee Water Company Corporation – Cherokee Water Company Corporation

> Lake Cherokee – the body of water within the physical area owned by CWC. (changed from Any property owned by Cherokee Water Company.)

Lot - One of the lots shown by maps of **Cherokee Water Company** property. Exact determination of the location of lot lines and lot corners and the exact distance of lot lines between the corners cannot be determined by reference to these maps; therefore, the final determination of the location of each lot is the authority of the Board of Directors. "Share lot" is an unimproved CWC lot which is held for the purpose of allowing Shareholders access to CWC facilities and Lake Cherokee.

Personal Watercraft - A motor powered vessel which is designed to be operated by a person or persons sitting, standing, or kneeling on the vessel rather than in the con-

ventional manner of sitting or standing inside the vessel. **Privilege Card** - A card or document

authorizing the bearer to certain privileges on CWC property and Lake Cherokee.

Shareholder - A person whose name appears on at least one share of stock of the Cherokee Water Company Wake Boat - An inboard boat designed for wakeboarding or wake surfing by creating large wakes. The Wake Boat accomplishes increased wake size by maximizing weight distribution at the back of the boat with rear engine placement, factory ballast systems or ballast bags.

Added the following definitions:

Bikini Island – the recreational island located on Lake Cherokee

CWC Park Lot– CWC land deemed unfit for development.

CWC Stock Certificate – the original stock certificate evidencing each Shareholder's share of CWC stock and certifying their lease of a parcel of land owned by CWC.

Firecracker Park – the peninsula, located on Lake Cherokee, accessible by water or land which serves as a recreational amenity for CWC Shareholders and guests.

General Manager – the individual selected and appointed by the Board of Directors to serve as General Manager of the Corporation

General Provisions

A. Fines & Penalties, 4:

If a Shareholder does not pay the annual lease rental within thirty (30) days of its due date, or a Shareholder becomes thirty (30) days delinquent in payment of any other indebtedness as may be determined by the Board of Directors of the Corporation, the matter shall be subject to further Board action which may result in the imposition of an additional fine and /or the suspension of their right to go upon CWC property or Lake Cherokee for such period as the Board of Directors may direct.

B. Transfer of Stock Certificate and Application for Lease

1. Death of Shareholder

b. CWC legal counsel shall be furnished with all legal instruments pertinent to ownership prior to transfer of stock certificate and lease agreement, in accordance with stock transfer as outlined in Bylaws.

3. Sale of Property:

The shareholder, or his/her duly authorized legal counterpart shall obtain a permit from CWC office to sell, offer for sale, or advertise for sale the share of stock and leasehold improvements, if any, before contracting to sell the same.

Other Business

With no other business, President Christy Bussey adjourned the meeting at 6:36 pm.

Remember: If the Proposed Sales and Use tax proposition is approved by the voters, it would authorize up to 2% to be captured by the District in all areas not yet at the State maximum of 8.25% and would not be lost in the rainy day fund. These additional funds would be used to the address the needs in the District. If this Sales tax Proposition is passed, it is estimated to bring in approximately \$400,000 or more in revenue to the GCESD#1. This additional revenue stream would substantially help in maintaining and improving the vital services provided by the EVFD.

LEASE RENEWAL REMINDER

The annual lease renewal is here. Payment of \$1475 is due on the first day of October and is considered late on the first day of November, and incurs a \$100 late fee. An additional \$100 will be charged for each month thereafter.

If the split payment option is chosen, the first half (\$750) is due on October 1st and will not be accepted after October 31st. After November 1st, the split payment option is no longer available. The second half of the split payment (\$750) is due on the first day of April, 2024 and is considered late on the first day of May.

Neither the lease application nor the annual lease payment can be accepted or processed by the staff until all of your fines, fees and penalties are satisfied. For late payment penalty purposes, the application or payment is not considered submitted until the day that the fines, fees and penalties are paid.

If you need assistance with paying the increased dues, contact the office to discuss temporary payments options approved by the board.



The group would decide on a general theme which is necessary for cohesiveness. Decisions about print size, color of matting. and framing would need to be addressed. Generally black frames are used. She had photographs of the group shows which demonstrated how many photographers can be cohesive. Members were asked to think about this idea and we could discuss at the next meeting.







Our program this month was Garrett Stamport with Pristine Pond Solutions. Garrett has been on the lake several times in the last 10 months. He had done fish shocking and grass management surveys for the lake.

The water plants that he recommends to be removed are American Lotus. Water Primrose, Water Pennywort, Cattails, and Water Lillies. These need to be removed when you find them. These plants usually grow around the shore line of our lake. Water is a prolific plant and needs to be removed also. Submerged plants like Hydrilla, Naiad, and Milfoil need to be removed. Grass Carp eat the plants they like the most at first. They don't like coontail and Hyacinth, milfoil. Cooper Sulphate should not be used in the lake. You can use Chelated Cooper Sulphate. Crappie spawn before bass and the eat the smaller bass. For our lake to grow larger bass we need to remove lots of smaller bass. Redear Bream are good to add to our lake. They eat grubs but only spawn one time a year. The bule gill bream spawn four or more times during the summer months. We need to remove all carp, bowfin, and gar you catch.

We need to monitor our lake for grass and fish growth.




