MINUTES OF THE BOARD OF DIRECTORS CHEROKEE WATER COMPANY February 16, 2023

A meeting of the Board of Directors of Cherokee Water Company was held at 6:00 pm on Thursday, February 16, 2023, at NK 20 Lake Cherokee, Longview Texas 75603 with the following Directors present:

Christy Bussey, President Randy Graves, Treasurer Cathy Hite, Secretary Rhonda Bullard Kristina Coolidge Seleta Davis Cory Eason Doug Finn Gary Mapes Thomas Merritt Paul Oberthier

President Christy Bussey called the meeting to order.

Cathy Hite, Secretary, pronounced a quorum.

Minutes of the January 19,2023 board meeting and January 27th,2023 special meeting of the Board of Directors were discussed, reviewed and stand approved as distributed.

Treasurers Report:

Randy Graves, Treasurer made a motion to certify the bills paid for month ending January 2023. A second was made by Seleta Davis. The motion passed unanimously.

Randy Graves, Treasurer made a motion to approve the Financial Management Policy. A second was made by Thomas Merritt. The motion passed with unanimously.

President's Report:

An operational update was provided including stats on administrative, patrol and maintenance departments.

Committee Reports:

Community Relations Committee:

Kristina Coolidge, Chair provided an update on the glitch that occurred with the Lake Cherokee portal this week and read a message that will be posted on the CWC website with the details. She reported that the committee met this month and reviewed the previous survey sent out to shareholders in 2021 via Survey Monkey. The committee updated survey questions with recommended explanations, edits, and additional questions and encourages shareholders to complete the survey when received. Survey results will be used to determine progress made since the last survey and also to assess the needs and wants of leaseholders and our growing lake community. Coolidge also reported that her committee is going to partner with the Natural Resources committee to provide key information on the status and plans for lake vegetation which will include maps and infographics. The committee also thanked and gave recognition to Misty for her commitment to CWC and excellent customer service.

The committee had no items requiring board action.

Road and Boat ways Committee:

Gary Mapes, Chair reported the committee didn't meet this month but the roadways project should begin in the next few weeks. The committee had no items requiring board action.

Natural Resources Committee:

Seleta Davis, Chair reported the committee met with Lake Biologist, Matt Ward this month and approximately 600 carp will be released in the next few weeks. The biologist will continue to treat and survey the lake and will make recommendations regarding any additional treatments required to manage vegetation. 2

The board has budgeted additional funds for vegetation control and is committed to doing everything possible to improve the vegetation conditions for the coming summer. Davis also reported CWC has contracted with Canvas to conduct surveys of the 29 tracts owned by CWC and develop a plan for the most beneficial use of each tract. She reported the 1st phase of the siltation survey has also begun.

The committee had no items requiring board action.

Rules and Policies Committee:

Rhonda Bullard, Chair reported the committee met this month . The committee has received an engagement letter to begin the project to review the General Rules and Procedures in an effort to reorganize the document and make it more user friendly, relatable and organized.

Variance Requests

It's the Law!

Operators must meet the age and boater education requirements shown below in order to operate any of the following vessels legally in Texas:

A powerboat powered by a motor of more than 15 horsepower or...

A personal watercraft or...

A windblown vessel over 14 feet in length.

A person less than 13 years of age may operate only if he or she is supervised by a person who:

- Is 18 years of age or older and...
- Can lawfully operate the watercraft and...
- Is on board when the vessel is underway.

A person at least 13 years of age and born on or after September 1, 1993, may operate without supervision only if he or she has passed a boater education course that is accepted by Texas Parks and Wildlife.



Location, location, location!



important steps in attracting Purple Mar-tins is choosing the right location for your martin housing. Mar-tins prefer housing that is placed in open areas with clear flyways. Choose the center of the largest open spot available, about 30-120 feet from human housing and at least 40-60 feet from trees. In the southern half of their breeding range, martins may accept housing that is placed within 25 feet of trees, but open areas are always best.





Place the housing where you can enjoy watching the birds. Entrance orientationnorth, east, south, or west—doesn't matter. But once the martins have arrived. make sure the housing is kept in the same orientation. If the housing spins or twists around the pole and is not reoriented, the martins may become disoriented and abandon their nests. Do not attach any wires to the house or pole that may lead to trees, buildings, or the ground as they may allow predators to access the housing

SPRING CLEANUP

The Annual Spring Cleanup will be conducted Friday, April 21st to Sunday, April 23rd, 2023. During that period, both the North Side and South Side roll-off container sites will be open between the hours of 10:00 am and 5:00 pm Friday and Saturday and 1:00 pm to 5:00 pm Sunday.

The sites will be manned by CWC employees. Residents may bring up to two (2) pickups full (approximately 6 yards) of non-hazardous household waste to the container sites for free disposal. If you need more than six (6) yards, please call Lee White at the CWC office, and make arrangements. All waste must originate from leased property at Lake Cherokee.

Rather than list what we will be accepting, let me list what we will not be able to accept.

We will not be accepting any of the following:

• Hazardous materials of any kind

• Liquids of any kind (examples: paint,

solvents, cooking oil, etc.) • Items that contain PCB's (i.e.,

• items that co transformers)

• Yard waste such as trees, limbs, grass

clippings, etc. • Shingles and roofing materials

Many of you wish we could accept yard waste and tree limbs, etc., unfortunately we cannot. To help with this problem, the CWC has arranged for shareholders to obtain, from the CWC office, landfill vouchers to dispose of these items at the Pine Hill Landfill. These vouchers are good for two (2) trips per year. Please call us for details of this program.

Through special arrangements, we will be able to accept some items that are not allowed at the landfill.

These include:

• Appliances including those that contain Freon such as air conditioners, refrigerators, and freezers

• Vehicle batteries will only be received at the north side disposal site

• Each year someone asks if we can take tires. We have made arrangements with a disposal provider; however, there will be a nominal charge per tire. If you have passenger vehicle tires or lawn equipment tires from your lot, the charge is \$4.00 per tire. This fee must be paid in advance. The office will generate a list of those authorized to dispose of tires. The tires will only be received at the North Side disposal site.

In order to participate in the cleanup, you must bring the items for disposal and proof that you are a shareholder at Lake Cherokee to the disposal sites during the dates and times given above. Proof may be in the form of a Privilege Card showing you are a shareholder or shareholder's spouse. In addition, a valid DL or other photo ID is required. If the shareholder or shareholder's spouse will not be present (i.e., you have arranged for someone else to transport your material for disposal,) you will need to call the office and make arrangements.

This cleanup is for household waste only from the shareholder's Lake Cherokee lot. No commercial disposal will be allowed.

Please take this opportunity to improve our environment, improve the quality of life for all of us on the lake and protect our community.



LEASE RENEWAL REMINDER

Payment is due April 1st for those shareholders that took advantage of the split payment option for the annual 2022-2023 lease renewal. (\$635.00) If payment is not received in the CWC office by April 30th, 2023, a \$100 late fee will incur.

Boater Safety Quiz

It's March and that means boating season on Lake Cherokee is just around the corner. Cherokee Water Company encourages all boaters and PWC operators on Lake Cherokee to operate their vessels safely and responsibly. Boaters on our lake are required to abide by the Texas Water Safety Act as enhanced by CWC Rules and Regulations. As a part of this effort, we will run a series of articles to remind you of safe boating rules and regulations, to refresh your recollection of boating rules specific to Lake Cherokee and common sense practices that make us all courteous and safe boaters. This month, we will start off with a short quiz to test your knowledge of some boating safety laws. Answers on page .



Need a permit to remove a dead or diseased tree? You don't have to come to the office but remember you must secure a permit from CWC before cutting trees from any CWC property. All trees that are requested to be removed shall be clearly marked. This can be done with a bright colored ribbon, spray paint or a paper plate tacked to it. Once you have the tree/s marked, call the Cherokee Water Company office and request a staff member to come to your lot to evaluate the tree/s and approve, if applicable, for a tree cutting permit to be issued. Trees smaller than ten inches (10") in diameter, thirty inches (30") from the ground, may be removed without restriction (although a permit is still required.) Any tree removed from CWC property without securing a permit will result in a fine being issued to the shareholder in the amount of \$500.00 per tree.





Favorite Fishing Places

Late last summer, I stepped down from my retaining wall onto what had previously been water but was then dry ground because the lake was so low. Although it seems so distant now because we've had so much rain, the lake was very low, and I had heard some lake residents say they couldn't get their boats out, or the water level was so low they were close to not being able to get boats out. We had plenty of water to get boats out, but we also had a dry place on the edge of our eastern shoreline that was literally growing by the day. I sat down on our retaining wall and jumped down onto the perfectly dry lake bottom with a trash bag in hand. My mission was to pick up trash that had floated in as the lake receded.

I removed a couple of drink cans and a wad of fishing line. I added a couple of sticks of various sizes just to have a clean "beach" to look at although that part of the shoreline was barely visible from my patio. But that's when I discovered the treasure: a hand-painted sign to mark someone's favorite fishing spot. The handmade sign is 2 ¹/₄ by 4 inches and is painted on both sides. One side is white paint only and was probably the "practice" side but is complete with small flowers. The other side is done in color. A piece of perhaps copper wire is wrapped tightly around a narrow rod to hold the sign in place. The edges of the sign are even painted to protect the wood. Can anyone identify who Kaitlyn is and where the sign was originally placed?





Despite the fact that I found this sign on dry ground mixed in with sticks and moss, in a nanosecond this grandmother could picture a parent but more likely a grandparent assembling this sign as a marker for an enthusiastic young granddaughter discovering the joy of fishing for and catching crappie.

When I found this sign, my mind raced back three-quarters of a century when my own father and grandfather introduced me to fishing on this very lake. My grandfather had moved a wooden barge from Caddo to Cherokee. This large wooden boat was painted green and had space for ten or twelve people to fish from it at the same time. What fun! I learned to bait my own hook and how to take the hook out of the fish without getting finned.

Unfortunately, dads these days may not have the time to pursue introducing sons and daughters to the wonders of nature. Everything in the world has become so expensive that parents are working more and more hours to provide food on the table and the roof over head. Time and opportunity to explore nature may be sacrificed as unavailable or sometimes traded for sports or music/dance/art experiences.

This small sign also brought back sweet memories of my adult son, Clayton, asking me to help him set up a crappie hole not long after we purchased our current Lake Cherokee home. He wanted to put it close to our pier but not too close so we would feel like we had people fishing in our boathouse. We had previously cut down a cedar tree which was too close to our driveway, so I helped him load it onto our fishing boat. We scrunched in among the branches and supplies and motored a few yards in front of our boathouse and tied up to a stump. Clayton filled some gallon milk jugs with water and capped them. He tied them to the trunk of the tree at various intervals to keep the cedar tree on the bottom. He also had "borrowed" a couple of landscaping stones from the yard and tied one on each end of the tree trunk with poly rope. We said a few words of dedication over our concoction and pushed it over the side of the boat and watched it sink.

We had no idea how successful or unsuccessful our efforts would be, but I was delighted to help my son in his effort to provide fishing excellence for fellow anglers on Lake Cherokee. We later learned that Fishing Club members shared the GPS with other members, and the fishermen did come! We just smiled and watched as they pulled in the fish.

My son died after a brief illness in 2017, but I still smile when boats come and tie up to fish our crappie hole. My daughter later made a sign which we put on our pier as a reminder of one who grew up fishing Lake Cherokee and who enjoyed sharing the sport with others.



Cream Cheese Bar Cookies

Ingredients

*1 (18.25 oz) package of

- Yellow Cake Mix 1/2 cup butter, melted
- 1 egg beaten
- 1 (8 oz) package cream cheese, softened
- 2 eggs beaten
- 3-1/2 cups confectioners sugar

Directions

Preheat oven to 350 degrees F (175 degrees C) and grease and flour a 15" x 10" sheet pan.

Mix together cake mix, melted butter, or margarine and 1 egg. Press mixture into pan.

In a small bowl, mix together softened cream cheese, 2 eggs and confectioners sugar. Pour mixture on top of cake mixture.


Bake for 15 minutes. Reduce temperature to 300 degrees F (150 degrees C), and bake for 30 to 35 minutes.

Cool and cut into squares.



Blake crappie have a smaller mouth and like nore structure and are in larger schools. White crappie like to roam around, Les uses Live scope and runs about 70 feet pointing forward. Les showed the members the kinds of jigs he uses.
