Electrofishing Report Summary Part One - Spring 2025

Water Quality

Lake Cherokee is located in a naturally acidic region of the United States and as a result, has a lower than optimal alkalinity. Alkalinity is a measurement of carbonate and hydroxide compounds in the water that play a role in pH stabilization and food chain production in ponds and lakes. Low alkalinity levels means less fish can be produced per acre and that the pH of the waterbody is likely to swing from low levels (5-6) up to high levels (9-10.5) throughout the day. These pH swings are stressful on the aquatic environment. Previous testing in 2024 revealed an alkalinity of 27ppm. This is above the minimum threshold of 20ppm but is still slightly below the minimum range to be classified as "good" for fish production and pH stabilization (30ppm). Alkalinities above 30ppm tend to produce more fish per acre, have more stable pH swings, and an overall healthier environment from microorganisms up to fish. Correcting low alkalinity can be done through the addition of agricultural lime at rates of 1-5 tons per acre depending on the starting alkalinity and target range. Alkalinity in acidic areas naturally degrades over time and as a result liming every 3-5 years may be needed. In a lake as large as Lake Cherokee (3900ac), liming would be a fairly large undertaking and will require community wide support. (More details on the benefits of liming on the aquatic ecosystem can be provided on request)

Aquatic Vegetation

Lake Cherokee is home to a very diverse spread of aquatic vegetation. All 4 categories of aquatic plants are present: floating, submerged, emergent, and algae. The current management plan for aquatic plants is centered around balancing recreation and fisheries. Natural areas that do not impede boating or recreational access are left untouched to ensure sufficient habitat for fish, birds, and other organisms. The second priority for aquatic plant management on Lake Cherokee is to target and attempt to extirpate invasive species, while promoting the growth and survival of native species. Several invasive species have been identified on Lake Cherokee and are intentionally targeted regardless of location in the lake (Species include: eurasian watermilfoil, hydrilla (not seen since spring 2024), hygrophila, alligatorweed, water hyacinth, and parrots feather). An environmental shift away from invasive species dominance leads to improved ecosystem health by providing more food and shelter for waterfowl, mammals, and aquatic organisms.

Forage Fish

The most abundant forage species collected during the electrofishing survey were gizzard shad and threadfin shad. Bluegill sunfish were the next most abundant, followed by redbreast sunfish, redear, and several minnow and chub species. Overall,

forage in Lake Cherokee is diverse and present in moderate abundance. Forage collected in this year's spring survey was lower than in the spring survey of 2024. However, this is likely attributed to the previous cold snaps that caused sunfish to pull back into deeper water. Sunfish such as bluegill and redear, tend to spawn after bass and crappie and therefore move up to shallow water slightly after. However, even considering this possibility, forage in the lake has never been overpopulated and both forage and sportfish would benefit from an increase in forage abundance.

Forage Fish Management

The number one way to increase forage abundance in the lake is to reduce predation pressure by harvesting predators. Bass and other predatory fish must consume approximately ten pounds of forage fish to gain one pound of body weight. This means that for a bass to reach two pounds it must consume twenty pounds of forage. Twenty pounds of bluegill at that size would equal roughly two thousand bluegill. Which means every time a bass, crappie, or other sportfish is culled from the environment, several thousand forage fish now become available for the remaining sportfish to eat, allowing them to grow faster. This is why harvesting predators is essential and also the most cost effective means for management. If you were going to try and stock forage fish to offset having to harvest it would cost \$1,500 per bass to grow a two pound fish and considering there may be 100 bass per acre or more when no harvest occurs, you are looking at \$150,000 per acre to grow some two pound bass. Clearly this method is unsustainable even for small half acre ponds, much less a large lake where it would cost over 500 million dollars annually to produce non trophy fish. The only way to produce quality fish r. With all of this being said, there is still one other way to assist in forage repopulation is to harvest enough sportfish each year to create balance. With that being said there is one other method that can be used to help improve forage fish and that is through supplemental stocking using the hatchery ponds. Now, after the previous discussion stocking may seem pointless, but that is only true if no harvest takes place. If enough sportfish are culled each year to rebalance the population, stocking fish using the hatchery ponds can increase the speed that forage fish populations recover. These ponds will have no predation and will be able to fill with tens to hundreds of thousand of baitfish each year. These fish can then be released into the lake to help forage species repopulate. In summation, the hatchery ponds will not fix the lake on their own, but adding more forage fish to a properly harvested lake will lead to a faster rebound in baitfish numbers, especially with consistent stocking and harvesting each year.

We appreciate everyone who took the time to complete this year's leaseholder survey. One of the key takeaways from the responses was that aquatic vegetation control is the top concern among leaseholders, narrowly surpassing issues like siltation and lake road maintenance. Aquatic vegetation is indeed a crucial aspect of lake management—it plays a vital role in the ecosystem by supporting fish habitats, improving water clarity, and maintaining ecological balance. However, too much vegetation can hinder recreational activities and limit access to certain areas. Striking the right balance is essential, and opinions understandably differ on how much control is too much.

While we have increased our vegetation control budget over the years, it remains relatively small in proportion to the overall size of Lake Cherokee. To make the most of these limited resources, we rely heavily on the expertise of our lake biologist to determine when, where, and how spraying should occur. Our biologist, who also works with other clients, notes that some spend half of our annual vegetation budget on bodies of water much smaller than ours. Given this, we must remain strategic and focused on high-use areas such as common swimming zones, the island, and other frequently visited spots.

Over the past year, we have also targeted several coves that were heavily overgrown and will continue these efforts this season. Additional attention is being given to lesserused boat lanes and areas south of Silvey Bridge that were previously overlooked. However, it is important to clarify that we cannot feasibly spray around every boathouse or retaining wall across the lake. With over 1,400 boathouses, doing so would deplete our entire budget almost immediately. Therefore, vegetation maintenance around individual boathouses remains the responsibility of the leaseholders.

We understand that some may suggest increasing the budget, but doing so would require cuts in other essential areas of lake operations. As we move

forward, we remain committed to responsibly managing vegetation in the most effective and equitable way possible. Our lake biologist is always available to answer any specific questions, and leaseholders are welcome to hire his services directly for individual vegetation concerns. Working together, we can maintain a lake environment that is both beautiful and functional for everyone.

Throughout the next several months, I will respond to other requests/concerns and praises that were given in the survey.

Lastly, with summer fast approaching, I encourage everyone to refresh themselves and their children on our rules and regulations concerning not only our boating rules, but vehicle operations on our lake roads. One

specific area of concern I am being notified of is the operation of golf carts on our lake roads. Please review the provisions of operating golf carts on our private lake roads, especially the age limit requirement to operate these vehicles. Also, Lake Patrol will be active this summer enforcing boater safety rules, so parents please remind your children of the importance of safely operating personal watercraft and review our rules and regulations with them pertaining to this. Our open water area isn't getting any larger, but the numbers of boats and personal watercraft operating on our lake is increasing, so safety is of the utmost importance! We look forward to a safe and fun summer with you all.

WHO NEEDS THE BOATER EDUCATION CARD?



Anyone born on or after September 1, 1993 who wishes to operate certain vessels on the public waterways of Texas.

It's the LAW!

Operators must meet the age and boater education requirements shown below in order to operate any of the following vessels legally in Texas: ·

- A powerboat powered by a motor of more than 15 horsepower or...
- · A personal watercraft or...
- A windblown vessel over 14 feet in length.

A person less than 13 years of age may operate only if he or she is supervised by a person who:

- Is 18 years of age or older and...
- Can lawfully operate the watercraft and...
- Is on board when the vessel is underway.

A person at least 13 years of age and born on or after September 1, 1993, may operate without supervision only if he or she has passed a boater education course that is accepted by Texas Parks and Wildlife.

A meeting of the Board of Directors of Cherokee Water Company was held at 5:00 pm on Thursday, March 20, 2025, at NK 20 Lake Cherokee, Longview Texas 75603 with the following Directors present:

President Gary Mapes called the meeting to order at 5:00 pm Dee Rea, Secretary, pronounced a quorum.

Dee Rea made a motion to approve the minutes of Board of Directors Cherokee Water Company, Thursday, March 20, 2025. Second by Cody Edmonson. The resolution passed by unanimous consent.

General Manager's Report:

Kevin provided an operation report including stats on administrative, patrol and maintenance departments. Other items reported on:

1. Kevin discussed the progress on the work of sealing the drainpipe at the dam. All bids will be received by the water company by April 20, 2025. The actual work will begin shortly afterwards.

Treasurers Report:

A motion was made by Randy Graves to certify the bills paid for the month of March 2025. Dee Rea seconded the motion. The motion passed unanimously.

A motion was made by Randy Graves to approve reporting of Financials for March 2025. Dee Rea seconded the motion. The motion passed unanimously.

Rules, Policy & Variance Committee:

David McDaniel presented variances to the Board for consideration: Three Variance Requests were considered:

NK 23: The Committee voted unanimously to approve a variance to add to an existing garage that will be less than 50 feet from the road. The Committee visited the site to confirm the variance request. David made a motion to the Board to approve the variance. Cory Eason seconded the motion. The motion passed unanimously.

NF 1C: The Committee voted unanimously to approve a variance to replace rotten wood on a porch and extend porch that will be closer than 75 feet from the water. The Committee visited the site to confirm the variance request. David made a motion to the Board to approve the variance. The motion was seconded by Cory Eason. The motion passed unanimously.

SU 9: The Committee voted unanimously to approve the variance to add on to an existing boathouse that is 100 feet into the water. Water depth at 100 feet is 4'8". The Committee visited the site to confirm the variance request. David made a motion to the Bo. to approve the variance. The motion was seconded by Alan Koelemay. The motion passed unanimously.

Rules Changes:

David McDaniel conducted the second reading for the following rule changes:

Current Rule: General Rules & Regulations, I. General Provisions; C:

Rights and Privileges of Shareholders and Others:

3.B. Firecracker Park gate access privilege cards will be issued (upon request) ONLY to shareholder, shareholders' spouse and unmarried dependent children under the age of 25. These cards are required to access the entrance and exit onto Firecracker Park.

Proposed Rule Change, Second Reading:

3.B Firecracker Park gate access Codes will be issued (upon request) ONLY to shareholder and shareholder's spouse. The shareholder and shareholder's spouse privilege cards reflect their access codes required to access the entrance and exist onto Firecracker Park.

Rationale: Instead of a gate access card, a gate code is issued to the Shareholder. Shareholder is responsible for the use of their entry code and for the behavior of their quests that access the park.

David McDaniel made a motion to approve this rule change. Motion was seconded by Randy Graves. The motion passed unanimously.

Current Rule: General Rules & Regulations, I. General Provisions; C: Rights and Privileges of Shareholders and Others:

3.G. Should a shareholder's spouse or resident no longer reside with the shareholder, it is the shareholder's responsibility to recoup the privilege card held by such a person and return it to the office. If not returned, no new privilege cards will be issued for spouse/resident until the previously issued card expires.

Proposed Rule Change, Second Reading:

3.G. Be Removed completely

Rationale: Resolves itself with each renewal. Difficult to enforce as we don't know when someone moves out.

David McDaniel made a motion to approve this rule change. Motion was seconded by Alan Koelemay. The motion passed unanimously.

Current Rule: General Rules & Regulations, I. General Provisions;

F. Lake Lot used for Residential Purposes Only

4. Commercial Billboards, political signs, real estate signs without permit from CWC and advertising of any description are prohibited.

Proposed Rule Change, Second Reading: Add Rule #5

5. General Contractors may place a sign for identification purposes once a construction permit is issued and removed when the construction project is completed. The sign can be no larger than 24X20 and contains LOT number, name of general contractor or DBA and contractor phone number. There can be no logos or advertisements.

Rationale: Assist subcontractors in locating the correct LOT/JOB for deliveries.

David McDaniel made a motion to approve this rule change. Motion was seconded by Cody Edmonson. The motion passed unanimously.

Current Rule: Construction Rules & Regulations V. Piers, Boathouses and other Structures Over the Water E. These standards shall be applied for new construction and for the reconstruction or rewiring of such existing.

facilities. Shareholders take full responsibility for ensuring water safety from all electrical risks caused by faulty, non-compliant electrical service to their piers, docks, and boathouses. Shareholders are responsible for ensuring theirstructures' electrical service is completed under the direction of a licensed electrician.

Proposed Rule Change, Second Reading:

Rationale: Rigid conduit a hazard around water.

David McDaniel made a motion to approve the rule change. Motion was seconded by Randy Graves. The motion passed unanimously.

Natural Resources Committee Meeting

Dee Rea, Chairman presented the following report of the committee:

The Committee is concentrating its efforts on the increasing siltation problem facing the Lake. It is the unanimous view of the Committee that addressing the siltation problem is the BOD'S top priority. Our goal is to improve the quality of water, increase the volume of water, provide access to property of shareholders and increase the property value of all shareholders. Silt removal is costly and time consuming, however, the BOD feels it is imperative to invest in maintaining and improving the Lake. This issue has been neglected in the past, so we ask for patience as we address the problem and we plan the funding for the projects.

We are presently negotiating with Hays Engineering Company about engineering and designing siltation ponds around the lake to catch the sediment before it enters the Lake itself. We want to build the ponds in locations and size so that the maintenance department of Lake Cherokee can perform the necessary maintenance. This will be an ongoing process as long as Lake Cherokee exists. At this time, we are concentrating on the NQ cove, NP cove and Mud Creek. The NQ cove will potentially be our largest project and take the most time. Silt and spoil removal has already begun by the maintenance department. As previously reported there are 2 potential plans for dealing with the sedimentation in the NQ cove. One plan is much grander in scale and will involve the voluntary contribution of funds by shareholders residing in the cove 0f the project. This will involve removal of all sediments in the cove to make most of the cove a depth of 6 feet.

The Committee encourages and recommends enforcement of placement of siltation fences around all construction projects where erosion is a probability. These fences should remain up until the project is completed and grass covers all areas of broken ground. An instruction sheet with details and diagrams on approved silt fencing is available at the water company office.

In our continuous battle with siltation the Committee has suggested a small barrier be placed around the new island to prevent erosion until grass takes hold. I think all Shareholders should compliment Kevin and the maintenance crew for the beautiful job they did on the new island.


Kevin is in discussion with AEP or SWEPCO management on how best to remove the sandbar at the end of the discharge canal of Knox Lee Power Plant. The discharge canal has significant erosion along its sides and will need to be repaired and fortified.

One last thing our committee is planning. We are looking to do Crown Thinning and underbrush removal in the Dogwood Circle area, NE area. This must be done to prevent an extreme fire hazard during dry weather or drought. There will be no clear cutting of any timber lands owned by the Cherokee Water Company. Prior to starting the work, the water company will inform Shareholders in the area the scope of work to be accomplished.

This concludes the Natural Resources Committee Report.

Community Relations Committee Report:

Cathy Hite presented the committee report in Kristina's absence. The Committee Members reviewed and discussed the Shareholder survey results as well as various

Office Manager Article

Thank you to everyone that completed the 2025 Shareholder survey. We had 561 responses. We will have several communications regarding the results. If you want to hear about the results directly, I will give a presentation at the May 15th Board Meeting.

I want to start by addressing a few of the comments or suggestions that were shared:

Comment 1: I think that all shareholders should have access to Firecracker Island without paying a \$50 fee to walk in.

Starting with the 24-25 lease renewal, there is NO fee. Instead, we have issued gate codes to shareholders and spouses for walk-in access to the island. If you need a code, you can contact the office.

Comment 2: I would be interested in more clarity on how each board member votes.

The board meeting minutes are posted in the Chatter each month. The results of votes taken during the meeting are part of the official minutes.

Comment 3: Disappointed with the board due to the presence of unelected members on the board.

You may be referring to the fact that in 2024, there was no official election due to only (4) shareholders applying to run for the board for (4) open positions. The Bylaws, Article IV Section 4 states: In the event that certified candidates are

equal or fewer in number than the number of board of director positions available, the Election Commission, at the completion of the candidate certification process, may recommend to the board of directors that the election not be conducted, and that the certified candidates be deemed elected as directors at the regular October meeting of the board of directors. In the event that certified candidates are fewer in number than the number of director positions available, the remaining positions may be filled by the other directors at any regular or special meetings of directors. In order to have an election, we need more shareholders to run for the board.

Comment 4: Lack of ability for a shareholder to approach the board for discussion.

Article IV Code of Conduct Board of Directors Meetings was amended in October 2023 to allow the OPEN FORUM portion of the Board meeting to be held either before or AFTER the official meeting. The OPEN Form provides shareholders with the opportunity to ask questions or provide comments directly to the board. Each shareholder is given 3 minutes to speak.

If you can't attend the board meeting, you can email the board directly to email address cwcboard@lkcherokee. com You also have access to this email address directly in the shareholder portal. We did have issues previously with our website with emails not reaching the board. We are not aware that there is still an issue once we shifted to the Portal. Our ask is if you send an email and do not receive a response, please contact me at the office and I will research the situation. The lack of responses to communications could be a technology issue.

Comment 5: More transparency and proactive communication vs reactive communication

This word – Transparency—seems to come up a lot. This can be defined many ways depending on the individual(s) using the term or the context. Transparency, in its simplest form, means being open and honest,

allowing things to be seen clearly and without hiding any information. The Board and CWC Management is open and honest with activities, decisions and questions regarding the operation of the business. There are some topics such as contract details, personnel matters or legal proceedings that are sensitive topics and must be kept private in the best interests of the Corporation. You may feel the timing of the communications could be better. That is different than lack of transparency. We put out communications via multiple channels: emails, Chatter and the shareholder portal. If the information can be shared publicly, we will post on the Lake Cherokee Facebook page. You will not see the Board, or the office respond directly to social media posts. There are a variety of reasons why but none of them are because board members/ CWC don't want to respond or because they are hiding anything. Sharing corporate information on social media doesn't lend itself to strong corporate responsibility and therefore we have been advised to only address communications via CWC formal channels. We do our best to get communications out directly to individuals impacted as soon as the information is available. What we can't control is the consumption of the information.

Comment 6: I would like to be provided an annual report

The annual report is available each year at the annual Shareholders meeting in November. Following this meeting, the reports are available in the office for pickup. These are not mailed out in order to save on the high postage.

Comment 7: Create non-profit foundation to benefit Lake Cherokee

There are currently (2) non-profits that support the lake.

Future communications will be focused on addressing key issues that the current board committees are discussing such as siltation. With transparency comes responsibility and trust.

WSIA WAKE RESPONSIBLY

The Water Sports Industry Association (WSIA) strongly recommends the following:

- 1. Always try to wakeboard or wake surf in the center of any given body of water, and avoid narrow channels or thoroughfares, if possible.
- 2. Always try to stay at least 200 feet away from any shoreline, dock, or fixed objects.
- 3. Maintain a reasonable sound level on your stereo.
- 4. Always respect the shoreline you are using and if the property owner asks that you leave, do so immediately, and always be gracious with the property owner.
- 5. Repetitive passes result in an accumulation of energy reaching the shoreline. Repetition is never

a good idea and can lead to risk of waterway conflicts.

- 6. The non-surfing side of a wake surfing boat creates waves that are 10% to 23% smaller with 23% to 33% percent less energy than the surfing side. When possible, present the non-surfing side of the boat to the closest shoreline.
- 7. Waves tend to increase in height on the inside of a gradual turn. Avoid such maneuvers close to shore.
- 8. Glass calm water is not a requirement for wake surfing, be respectful and operate as far from shore as you can.

Mid-Year Update from the Board

Dear Shareholders of Lake Cherokee,

As we reach the midpoint of our current fiscal year, I would like to take a moment to share an update on what's happening around Lake Cherokee and within the Cherokee Water Company.

Following our long-term strategic plan, the Board of Directors initiated a 10-year project to refurbish all roads on Lake Cherokee. So far, a little over 6 miles have been successfully completed over Road Refurbishment Progress the past two years. This fiscal year, we are set to complete another 3 miles, keeping us on pace to meet our goal. This phased approach allows us to maintain financial responsibility while steadily improving the infrastructure our shareholders rely on every day. Thus, our current phased strategy allows us to allocate resources effectively while gradually improving our roadways for the benefit of all residents. Implementing these refurbishments is essential not only for enhancing the safety and accessibility of our roads but also for preserving property values and promoting a vibrant community atmosphere. Your continued support and understanding are critical as we navigate this process, balancing the desire for immediate improvements with the realities of financial planning.

Environmental Conservation: <u>Our Natural Resources</u>
<u>Committee</u> has been extremely busy this year, having met numerous times since January 2025. The current CWC board of directors has made siltation and sedimentation removal a top priority, identifying key areas around the lake that have major concerns. We are currently collaborating with professionals, including engineers, to determine the best approach for addressing these issues. In addition to siltation removal, the committee is looking into crown thinning and removal of dead trees in several areas around the lake that are heavily overgrown and pose an extreme fire hazard. The board is in the process of receiving bids for a project in the NE section, which will help mitigate these risks while enhancing the overall health of our local ecosystem.

Given the extent of the areas that need attention and the associated costs, the process of siltation removal will follow a similar timeline as our road refurbishing project. We aim to tackle several areas each year, acknowledging that it will take multiple years to fully complete our environmental initiatives. Your continued support in these efforts is crucial for preserving the natural beauty and safety of Lake Cherokee.

Recently CWC sent out a survey to all shareholders. Thank you to all who completed the survey. Approximately 1/3 of the shareholders responded to the survey. This is more than the survey that was done two years ago, but we had hoped for a significant increase with well over 50% of the shareholders answering the survey.

The survey results showed the two of the biggest areas of concern, the roads and siltation of CWC. Both of these issues are critical to the success and vitality of CWC. The board's challenge is how to continue to address the roads and siltation and remain within the CWC budget. Beginning in late May to early June, CWC management will begin working on the 2025-2026 budget, presenting it to the finance committee, and then the entire board. A dues increase is not popular, however, to continue to provide services that allow CWC to maintain its vitality and maintain the property values on the lake, a dues increase will likely be in the discussion when the budget for next year is developed.

As we look forward to the second half of the fiscal year, the board's focus remains on maintaining the high standards that make Lake Cherokee such a special place to live. On behalf of the entire Board of Directors and staff at Cherokee Water Company, we appreciate the opportunity to serve you.

National Safe Boating Week

May 17-23, 2025

National Safe Boating Week

will be held from May 17-23, 2025, reminding all boaters to brush up on boating safety skills and prepare for the boating season. This observance week is the annual kick-off of the Safe Boating Campaign, a global awareness effort that encourages boaters to make the most of their boating adventure by being responsible.

"We're committed to teaching boaters that the best boating experience is a safe day on the water," said Peg Phillips, executive director of the National Safe Boating Council, a nonprofit dedicated to helping create a safe boating experience for all boaters and the lead organization of the Safe Boating Campaign. "

This National Safe Boating Week, prepare for a great boating season by inspecting your boating safety gear and commit to providing comfortable life jackets for all your passengers to wear every time you go boating. U.S. Coast Guard statistics show that drowning was the reported cause of death in four out of every five recreational boating fatalities, and that 75 percent of those who drowned were not wearing life jackets.

There are many options for boaters when it comes to choosing a life jacket. When selecting a life jacket, a boater should check that it is U.S. Coast Guard approved, appropriate for the water activity, and fits properly. "The best life jacket is the one you will wear," said Phillips. "Whether you're going fishing or just enjoying a ride on the boat, make sure you're prepared for the adventure by wearing a life jacket and knowing how to use required safety gear."

The National Safe Boating Council recommends these tips for boaters:

Take a boating safety course.

Gain valuable knowledge and on-water experience in a boating safety course with many options for novice to experienced boaters.

Check equipment.

Schedule a vessel safety check to make sure all essential equipment is present, working and in good condition.

Wear a life jacket.

Make sure everyone wears a life jacket – every time. A stowed life jacket is no use in an emergency.

Use an engine cut-off switch – it's the law.

An engine cut-off switch is a proven safety device to stop a powerboat engine should the operator unexpectedly fall overboard.

Watch the weather.

Always check the forecast before departing on the water and frequently during the excursion.

Know what's going on around you at all times.

Nearly a quarter of all reported boating incidents in 2022 were caused by operator inattention or improper lookout.

Know where you're going and travel at safe speeds.

Be familiar with the area, local boating speed zones, and always travel at a safe speed.

Never boat under the influence.

A BUI is involved in one-third of all recreational boating fatalities. Always designate a sober skipper.

Keep in touch.

Have more than one communication device that works when wet. VHF radios, emergency locator beacons, satellite phones, and cell phones can all be important devices in an emergency.

Have you seen it yet? If not, it's time to clean off that pollen-covered boat and go for a cruise. Or you can drive up to Persimmon Point and visit the Park by land.

What's happened so far?

Generous donations have made dreams into reality. The Wall of Honor is partially completed. The concrete wall is up. The black granite has been ordered and should be installed before Memorial Day weekend. The 126 veteran names are at the "stencil guy" and we are awaiting a proof to send out to the donors who secured a spot for their veteran(s). Those names need to be approved by the donors, then any changes/corrections will be sent back for a final stencil. Once we have that stencil, an engraver will place the stencil over the installed black granite and sand blast on site. Thomas White continues to generously donate his time and expertise to manage the design and construction process. Thank you, Thomas!

The flagpole plaques are out for bid. These plaques will display the name of flagpole (e.g., "ARMY") and the flagpole sponsor info. We have pricing

for engraved black granite slabs, but we are also looking at laser-etched anodized aluminum plaques. Both promise to be beautiful and enduring, but we need pricing, installation information, and a timeline for comparison.

Landscaping so far has included dirt work/leveling, dismantling the old Lake internet antenna and part of the old fence, and building a new fence between the flag display and fuel station for aesthetics and security. The entire site has a new irrigation system, thanks to the amazing donation from Expert Irrigation. Thank you, Chris and Melanie Matthews!

We have a lawn! Thanks to volunteers who scoffed at sore backs and bum knees, and didn't mind getting a little dirty. A truckload with 20 pallets of sod arrived from Arkansas at 7:30am – and the lawn was finished by lunchtime!

What's next? Garden beds will be "readied" for future greenery. A walkway made of crushed granite is being priced out. And we are gathering information for a possible boat dock/pier so that visitors can dock and walk to the flagpole display. If you would like to be a part of this process, please contact us.

Friends of the LCVM Park. Last year, a loose collection of veterans and supporters, informally called the "Friends" provided valuable feedback on construction and design. This group organized the 2024 Veterans Day Ceremony in November and helped the Lake Cherokee Community Foundation (LCCF) put on the incredibly successful November fundraising gala at the Cherokee Club. Construction is winding down, but now, the Friends are looking at

using LCVM Park for ceremonies, veterans' activities, and special events. Importantly, the Friends are researching ways to honor more veterans since the Wall of Honor is full.

This week, Miguel Fabbiani and Barrett Newsom have agreed to co-lead the Friends group and be stewards of the LCVM Park for the next year (or so). We couldn't have asked for more qualified leaders. Barrett is a Lieutenant Colonel and currently serves as Chief of Mobilization for the US Army Corp of Engineers. He has served in the Army since 2005 and was involved in Operation Iraqi Freedom, Operation New Dawn, Operation Inherent Resolve, and Operation Allies Welcome. Miguel is an Army veteran (1996 - 2018) and former Green Beret. He served in Operation Enduring Freedom and Operation Iraqi Freedom. He currently works in security at





CODE COMPLIANCE CORNER

Hello!

As part of our shared commitment to protecting the lake and its surrounding environment CWC silt fence requirements have been recently updated. When erosion is not properly controlled, sediment from disturbed soil makes its way into the lake — a process known as **siltation**. Over time, this buildup of fine particles reduces the **depth of the lake**, especially near the shoreline and in shallow areas. This can interfere with recreational use and alter natural habitats. Preventing siltation through erosion control measures is essential to maintaining the health, usability, and longevity of Lake Cherokee.


We strongly encourage—and where required, enforce—the use of silt fences around all areas of active construction,

where the ground has been disturbed, or dirt has been placed on the shareholder lot. Silt fence requirements are attached to the permit documents. I ask that you please take the time to review them.

Below are some key requirements:

- Silt fence should be installed to contain any debris from flowing into the lake or onto other shareholder's property. SHAREHOLDER IS RESPONSIBLE FOR ANY CLEANUP REQUIRED.
- STEEL POSTS which support the silt fence should be installed on a slight angle toward the anticipated runoff source.
- Filter fabric is to be MIRAFI 100X OR APPROVED EQUAL WITH STEEL MESHED BACK FOR REINFORCEMENT (TYPE C FENCE)
- 4. SILT FENCE TO BE REMOVED ONLY WITH APPROVAL BY CWC CODE COMPLIANCE OFFICER. Damaged areas to be repaired including re-grading and re-grassing as necessary to prevent future siltation runoff.

Thank you for your continued cooperation and for helping preserve the natural resources that make our community special.



OPERATION OF WATERCRAFT



Privilege card holder must be born before Sept 1, 1993 unless operator is 13 years of age or older and has passed a boaters education course; or is accompanied by a person at least 18 years of age and can lawfully operate the watercraft

SPEED LIMITS & BOAT SAFETY

- Not above idle speed within 50 ft of any vessel, person, shore or stationary object
- NO speed in excess of 40 mph in open or ski waters (day) or 30 mph (night)
- 30 mph in named boat roads
- · 10 mph access boat roads



WAKE BOATS



Empty water-filled ballast systems prior to traveling on boat road. Ballast bags containing solid materials such as steel shot, gravel or sand shall be moved to the center-front of the Wake Boat. Passengers much move to the front of the Wake Boat.

WATER SKIING

- Restricted to open water marked by buoys and no closer than 150 ft from piers and boathouses.
- Any boat pulling water skis require a min. of 2 people in the boat so that driver can keep proper lookout.
- All skiers are required to wear approved flotation device.
- PWC can not pull a person or persons on water skis on Lake Cherokee



PROHIBITED BOATING AND FISHING AREAS



- No closer than 100 ft to carp fence
- No boating in the SWEPCO canal or City of Longview water intake area
- No tying boats to buoys

SWIMMING

- Only Privilege Card Holders and guests are allowed to swim in Lake Cherokee
- Prohibited from the spillway to Section NB, from the dam, SWEPCO canal, boat roads and City of Longview intake area or CWC office piers
- Limited to 100 ft from shore, pier, or boathouse
