A meeting of the Board of Directors of Cherokee Water Company was held at 1:35 PM on Monday, November 10, 2025, at NK 20 Lake Cherokee, Longview Texas 75603 with the following Directors present:

President Gary Mapes called the meeting to order at 1:35 PM.

Dee Rea, Secretary, pronounced a quorum.

Rules, Policy & Variance Committee David McDaniel presented the following Variance Committee Report The Committee reviewed 5 variance requests:

NR -15: A variance was requested to build a 2652 square foot single family dwelling that will be closer than 75 feet from the shoreline. The variance was reviewed by the Committee, and they voted unanimously to approve the variance. SF-21: A variance was requested to build with a new outdoor BBQ area that is less than 75 feet from the shoreline and closer than 6 feet from the side

property line. The variance was reviewed by the committee and all committee members voted to approve the variance. SH-34: A variance was requested to build a new edition to an existing home that already violates the 6-foot setback rule on side property lines The variance was reviewed by the Committee, and they voted unanimously to approve the variance.

SK-46: A variance was requested to renovate and enlarge an existing accessory building with separate concrete pad to be 16'W x 36'L building with a single slab and add a 16'W x 10'L wooden deck (on lake side); widen a portion of existing driveway and extend to accessory building. Remove a tree on lot SK-46 that has grown to a size that is causing damage. The variance was reviewed by the committee, and the committee voted unanimously to approve the variance.

SL-56: A variance was requested to build a new carport and driveway with carport being 52 feet from shoreline and 48 feet from the road. The variance was reviewed by committee, and they voted unanimously to approve the variance.

David McDaniel made a motion to the Board that all 5 variances be approved. Randy Graves seconded the motion. Kristina Coolidge recused herself from voting on SH-34. The motion passed with majority consent.

With no other business, Gary Mapes adjourned the meeting at 1:39 pm.



CODE COMPLIANCE CORNER

Merry Christmas and Happy New Year, CWC! As we get ready to welcome 2026, it's a wonderful time to reflect on the past year and look forward to new beginnings at the lake. With the start of a new year comes fresh projects and the chance to strengthen bonds with neighbors and the lake community. Together, let's make this coming year one of collaboration, respect, and enjoyment.

With this in mind, I want to touch on a few important topics for the year ahead with the first being **permits**. Before any projects can begin, shareholders must secure a permit before constructing any structure, making repairs, renovations, or improvements to an existing structure, placing any type of structure, or making site modifications on any lot on CWC property. These requirements help ensure that all projects align with our community standards and protect both safety and property values.

Please remember that permits **ARE NOT** required for interior remodeling, exterior painting, landscaping, or general yard maintenance. Following the established permit process helps keep things running smoothly and maintains fairness for everyone.

I also want to emphasize the importance of **neighborly communication**. This year, I have seen an increasing amount of tension and conflict between neighbors, something that feels out of place in a community as beautiful and peaceful as Lake Cherokee. It's surprising, and honestly disappointing, to see how often simple conversations never take place or if they do, they escalate instead of leading to resolve.

The Compliance Office exists to ensure community rules are followed and to provide guidance, not to mediate disputes and longstanding grudges. All too often,

neighbors turn into bigger conflicts because people skip the step of talking directly and assume the office should step in to resolve the matter. Before contacting the Compliance Office, I strongly encourage neighbors to attempt to resolve concerns directly with one another through calm, civil conversation. CWC will refrain from deciding on matters that are unclear or lack sufficient evidence to decide on a course of action. If a determination cannot be made, the matter may need to be addressed through avenues beyond CWC's authority.

Of course, if you have any questions about whether something requires a permit or if a situation truly needs Compliance Office involvement, please feel free to reach out to me directly. My approach has always been, and will continue to be fair, impartial, and focused on doing what's right. Thank you for your continued cooperation!



IT IS TIME TO WINTERIZE Boat Winterizing Checklist

If winterizing your boat sounds like a difficult task, learn how to winterize your boat and use this simple checklist to winterize your boat in less than a day.

- Change the oil and oil filters
- Change the lubricant in engine transmission or the outboard lower unit
- Apply fogging if called for by manufacturer
- Drain the boat's fuel tanks as much as possible
- Fill the boat's fuel tanks completely full
- Add biocide and/or stabilizing agents to fuel
- Change the fuel filters
- Add antifreeze to the engine's cooling system
- Add distilled water to batteries, charge completely and disconnect
- Charge batteries to capacity

Fish Identification Guide - Sunfishes of Cherokee Part 1

Introduction

Sunfish is a term used to describe fish species in the Lepomis genera, often referred to in the south as perch or brim. While these common names are often broadly used to describe multiple species (all are often called brim/perch) this group of fish is actually very diverse and identification can be difficult. In this article we will break down key identifiers for the most common sunfish species present in Lake Cherokee.

Bluegill - Lepomis macrochirus

Bluegill are the most abundant sunfish in lake cherokee and can be identified by a small mouth, green to dark olive color, vertical bars on their sides, an all black ear flap (no other color or it is not a bluegill), and a black spot on their dorsal fin. Prespawn males may also have noticeable blue margins on their gills (do not confuse this with green sunfish) and a yellow to orange chest.



Redbreast Sunfish - Lepomis auritus

Redbreast sunfish are the second most abundant species based on electrofishing data. These fish reach much smaller sizes than bluegill and can be identified by a yellow to rust colored belly, a narrow and long ear flap with a pale margin; prespawn males may have orange to red spots, blue lines on their gill plates, red coloration in their dorsal and tail fins, and some blue coloration on their body.



Redear Sunfish - Lepomis microlophus

Redear sunfish are present in relatively low abundance on lake cherokee but are easily identified by the orange to red margin on their ear flap. They also have a pale green to olive body with irregular blotches (almost a camouflage look).



Warmouth - Lepomis gulosus

Warmouth sunfish have many common names such as goggleye and are often confused with green sunfish and rock bass due to their bass-like body shape and large mouth. These fish can be identified by dark, irregular vertical bars, dark lines radiating from the eye on the gill plate, a small red dot on the edge of their ear flap, a light brown to nearly black color, and a tooth patch on their tongue.

End-of-Year Shareholder Update

As 2025 comes to a close, the CWC Board of Directors would like to extend our gratitude to all shareholders for your continued support, trust, and investment in the health and longevity of our community and natural assets. This year, we continued our focused-on key infrastructure and environmental priorities that directly support the long-term integrity of the lake, roadways, and surrounding forested areas.

Completed and Ongoing Projects

1. Road Refurbishment - NP Section

One of the major infrastructure projects this year was the refurbishment of the road in the NP and the NQ section of Lake Cherokee. This upgrade has improved driving conditions, increased safety, and reduced wear and tear on vehicles—benefiting all who live in or visit the area. We are committed to maintaining our roadways to a high standard.

This was the third year in a row that the CWC has completed a road refurbishing project.

2. Siltation Control and Lake Health

Preserving the lake is one of our highest priorities. In 2025, we made significant progress on sediment and siltation man-

- Siltation removal in the NQ cove is currently underway. It is projected to be finished in the next 6 weeks.
- An enlarged siltation pond was also constructed in the NQ cove to reduce the future buildup of debris and sediment.
- We have now identified and mapped siltation ponds around the lake. These ponds play a vital role in trapping runoffs and preventing further siltation of our waterway.
- Maintenance of these ponds will be performed annually or as needed, based on environmental conditions and performance monitoring.

This proactive work strengthens the health of the lake, supports wildlife, and preserves recreational use for years to

3. Forest Management - Tree Thinning in NE Circle

This fall, the Board initiated a tree thinning project in the NE Circle area. Years of unchecked growth had created dense, overgrown zones that posed serious

wildfire risks and hindered healthy forest development. Strategic thinning promotes healthier timber growth, improves visibility and access, and significantly reduces the risk of uncontrolled fire spread.

These projects reflect our commitment to responsible stewardship of CWC's resources and shared spaces. Heading into 2026, the Board will continue to prioritize environmental protection, infrastructure upkeep, and the safety of our residents and visitors.







Bryce also extended his appreciation for everyone who has stepped up to volunteer at the fishing tournaments, meeting set up/clean up and program development.

Genia reported that Jones Supply is moving their 24-hour bait opera-

tion to a more permanent location next to their main entrance. Owners of Jones are pleased with the business they are getting from fishing and hunting enthusiasts. They also offer licenses. Check it out!

Other business included a reminder of the upcoming elections for the club board. President, Secretary and Habitat Director are open. All positions have incumbents who will be there to support and transition new leaders into the role. Please let Bryce or Genia know if you are interested. Elections will be in January.

Our first Bounty Bass Contest was a success. Dana Deason

presented the winner, Ryan Hill (7.9 lbs) his prize, a 7' Pride Spinning rod. Congratulations Ryan! Dana hinted Pride Fishing Rods may be interested in supporting more contests like this in the future.

Gary Lindsey, Hatchery Director, reported the fish feeders at the mega structure are being refurbished. Gary mentioned he is start-

ing the search for his successor. If you are interested, please let him know.

George Steele, Habitat Director gave an update on the great progress being made to build our new

fish attractors. 48 new structures have been put out so far. They were very easy to sink in the water. 14 more are ready to put out and there are plans to build 30 more. That should be enough to replace all our decaying brush structures.

This is a huge leap forward in creating long-term habitats here in the lake. The habitats were made mostly with concrete and reclaimed piping from the recent utility installation along 149. Additional costs turned out to be minimal. Thank you, George and team, for making this happen! This effort will benefit all who fish here.

David Wilson, Tournament Director reported results of the Fall bass tournament. 18 teams weighed in over 250 pounds of bass. First place team was David Googe and Greg Wallace, bringing in 25.53 pounds. Big bass was from Greg Wallace, bringing in a 5.79 pounder. All bass were weighed and measured for the ongoing data collection by our Lake Biologist. This will be used to track progress of our

fish management activities and inform decisions for bag limits in 2026.

Our program was Lake Cherokee's own Cooper Mayes. Cooper grew up fishing on the lake and is an active supporter of youth fishing programs in the area. He graduated

from Texas A&M this May and is currently working on his master's degree. Cooper shared insights on what it takes to get the big bass in Lake Cherokee. I won't share ALL the tips, as that benefit goes to those who attended the meeting! He showed what areas on the map

are likely to hold fish this time of year and acknowledged you must be willing to move from place to place throughout the day. Small ridges and stumps are where you'll find them, more in shallower water (8-15 feet) as it gets colder.

We wrapped up with the raffle. Winners: Jerald Lewis scored the coveted gas can; Harrison Modisette won a bottle of Bird and Spider stain remover to help his parents keep their boat spotless; Dawson Jaskiewicz won a tackle bag; David Tramel, a nice hat and shirt, Genia Holland won some custom jigs, and Jason Murray snagged a mosquito repellent system.

December meeting is all about food, fellowship and helping others. We will have a toy drive and collect food for Samaritan House. Join us for a special meal and to be with people who love this lake and everything about fishing. Those who would like to participate in a gift exchange can bring a new, wrapped lure. See you December 8th!
